RESEARCH INTERESTS

In my research pursuits, I focus primarily on communication at the intersection of postcolonial theory and rhetoric. From a postcolonial perspective, I am interested in how immigrant communities navigate their identities in their transnational spaces of migration. My work has, thus far, focused on the Mauritanian immigrant community, examining how different members from different facets of this community negotiate their problematic shared past together in an effort to achieve more unity as a diaspora. From a rhetorical and postcolonial perspective, I examine how xenophobia and Othering manifest in Western public discourses with a specific focus on understanding how these discourses perpetuate an orientalist tradition that portrays the Other negatively.

PEDAGOGIC EXPERIENCE

Utah State University – Communication Studies

<u>CMST 6300 – Culture and Difference</u>

Spring 2023 – Present

Spring 2022 – Present

This graduate level course introduces students to the history of intercultural communication and the different paradigmatic shifts before focusing on specific areas of importance to intercultural communication research and pedagogy.

CMST 4270 – Communication, Culture, and Power

The course exposes students to a broad array of perspectives that showcase how communication is sometimes used to perpetuate, as well as resist, problematic ideas in cultural contexts. The goal is to invite students to reflect on the role communication (broadly construed) plays in the creation and sustenance of hegemonic ideas as well as its potential is resisting them.

<u>CMST 1330 – Intro to Global Communication – Online</u> Spring 2020 – Fall 2022

This course serves as an introduction to a variety of issues that are of interests to scholars of global communication. Examining globalization as a phenomenon, we explore the role communication, and the implications globalization has for us as students of global communication. In this course, students learn about cross cultural communication, differences in media systems, communication and the Other, public diplomacy, transnational spheres, etc.

<u>CMST 4800 – Qualitative Research in Communication Studies</u> Fall 2019 – Present

This course explores the qualitative paradigm, exposing students to the ontological orientation and the epistemological assumptions that guide qualitative

research. As an intro to qualitative research in communication studies, the course is designed to provide students with an opportunity to understand both the theory and the practice of conducting qualitative research.

<u>CMST 3270 – Culture and Public Discourse</u> Spring 2018 – Present

This course examines the symbiotic relationship between media and culture. It is designed to help students recognize the impact the media we use have on our culture, and ultimately our public discourse - the conversations we are able/unable to have. The course starts from the assumption that the different media we use come with its own biases allowing certain types of conversations and disallowing others. Students are also invited to examine media content reflecting on the ideas it serves/those that it marginalizes.

<u>CMST 2120 – Small Group Communication</u> Fall 2017 – Spring 2021

This intro to small group communication course is meant to help students become effective group members. Learning about group communication theories, students reflect on and deal with the challenges that make it hard to engage in effective decision making and problem solving.

CMST 3330 – Intercultural Communication	Fall 2017 – Present
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This course is designed to help students become ethical intercultural communicators. Starting with the assumption that reality is socially constructed, the course helps students understand that others have "good reasons" for the things they believe. Realizing that our attitudes towards the world are largely a product of our experiences, students are able to see where others are coming from without necessarily agreeing with them. Students are then able to appreciate the differences and recognize the similarities they have with others.

Ohio University – Communication Studies

<u>COMS 2350 – Introduction of Communication Theory (Teaching Assistant)</u> 2016 - 2017

This is an upper level course that is designed to familiarize the students with the major theories that communication scholars draw from. Serving as a survey of major theories, students are introduced to the types of questions communication scholars ask and the different approaches they follow in attempting to answer them.

<u>COMS 2050 – Techniques of Group Discussion</u>

2015 - 2017

This intro to group communication course is meant to help students become effective group members. Learning about group communication theories, students reflect on and deal with the challenges that make it hard to engage in effective decision making and problem solving.

<u>COMS 2050 – Techniques of Group Discussion – Online</u> 2016 - 2017

This intro to group communication course is meant to help students become effective group members. Learning about group communication theories, students reflect on and deal with the challenges that make it hard to engage in effective decision making and problem solving. Because many individuals now find themselves working with others virtually, students are introduced to the challenges that arise when working with others in the online space.

<u>COMS 1100 – Communication Among Cultures</u> 2014 - 2017

Starting from the assumption that we all occupy multiple identities that may be a source of both advantages and disadvantages, this course is meant to help students learn/reflect on major identities and how they can contribute to issues of privilege and marginalization. The idea behind the course is for them to be familiar with the nuances of these issues and recognize the role they can play in being a positive presence in others' lives.

<u>COMS 1030 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking</u> 2013 – 2015

This course introduces students to the practice of public speaking as a form of civic engagement. Students learn to construct and deliver different types of speeches that are suitable for different occasions/audiences.

<u>Ohio University – African Studies</u>

<u>MEDIA 5170 – Media and the Muslim World (Teaching Assistant)</u> 2012 – 2013

This course examines media in the Muslim world, looking at issues of freedom, government control, and oppression. It also looks at the portrayal of Muslims in Western media, highlighting how Western media portrayal of Muslims has tended to perpetuate an orientalist tradition of viewing the Muslim as the Other.
